Birds of the Neighborhood

Living at the edge of the City, surrounded by woodlands and park lands, we have great opportunities for adventures with birds.

Once you see something interesting, you will be hooked.

A great resource is a handbook of the birds of central Texas. I keep mine next to the binoculars beside the backdoor for quick identifications.

Another source for our backyard birds is the Travis County Audubon site (link below). They've also been very helpful with questions.

I've seen a turkey hen cross Old Lampasas Road, a raven perch on the power pole for a chat, great blue herons flying by, a black



vulture land in the yard and saunter over for a sip from the pool, Red-Shoulder hawks (nest nearby) flying all around, and the list goes on.

We are on the Central North American Migratory Path and soon our Canadian friends will be going by. Geese can fly 40 MPH and up to 70 MPH with a tailwind.

Exotic birds show up, such as a white cockatiel in our woods one winter. It flew off and landed on the shoulder of a neighbor, who provided shelter for the night. Using the FB page for lost birds (link below), the bird was reunited with its human flock.

Have you heard an unfamiliar call? The Cornell site (link below) has just about everything you need to know. I discovered that one incessant nighttime call was a Chuck Will's Widow (nightjar family) and a different owl call belonged to a Great Horned Owl, which I've never seen but does drop by sometimes.

Who has visited you all? Maybe we should have a BVS birders' list.
